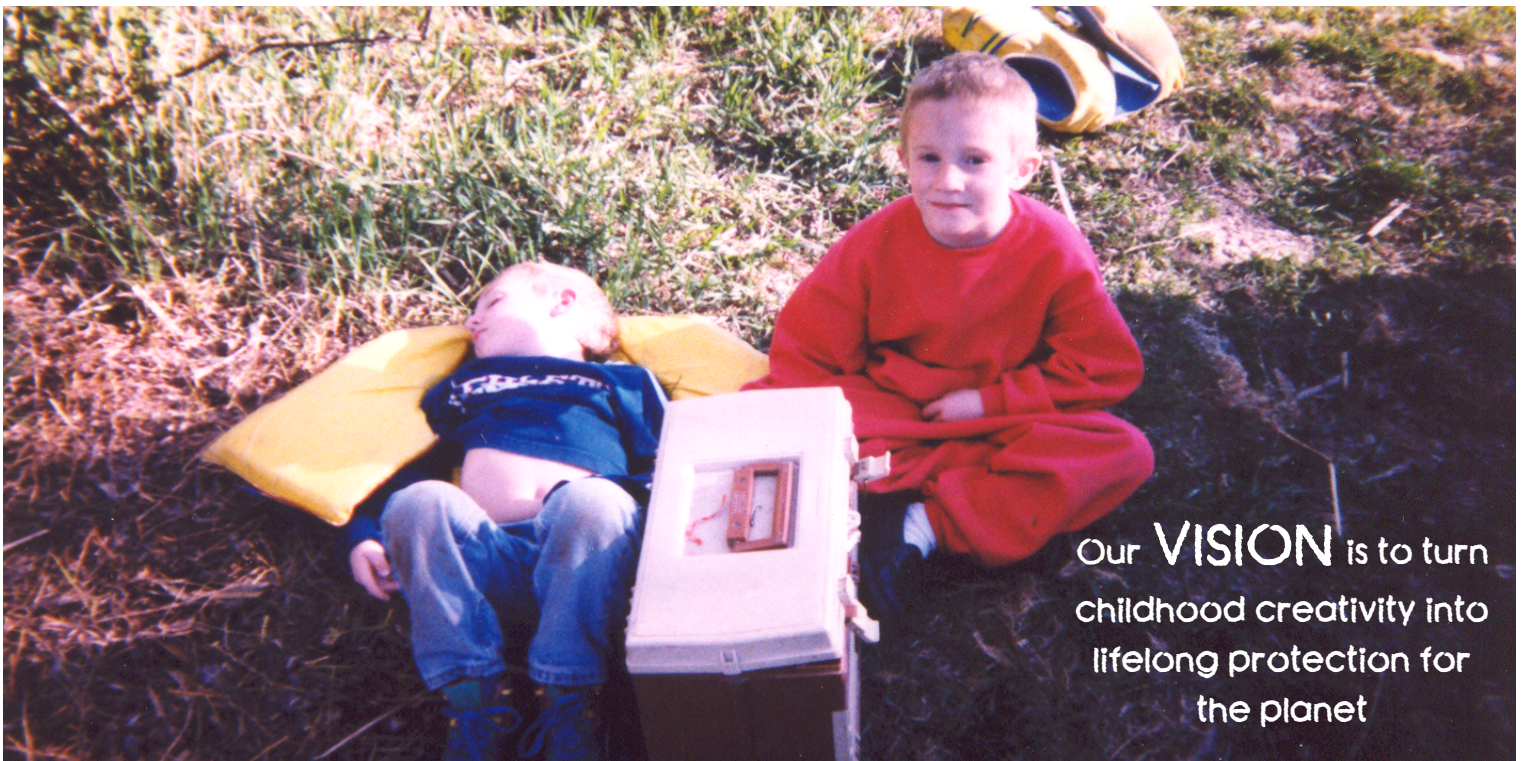

Dear Conservation Partner,

Conserve with Crayons is a newly established 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to inspiring the next generation of conservationists through creativity, education, and engagement. Our mission is to spark a lifelong passion for wildlife conservation and habitat protection in children and families.

The idea for Conserve with Crayons began with our own children. After participating in a few local coloring contests, they became excited about creating artwork and competing for prizes. As parents, we searched for larger recurring coloring contests that children everywhere could participate in, but found very few opportunities beyond local businesses and community organizations. As a Grassland Ecologist, I saw an opportunity to combine creativity with conservation education in a way that could reach children and families across the country.

Conserve with Crayons hosts free conservation-themed coloring contests for all ages up to 18 year old. Each contest focuses on a different ecosystem, species, or conservation topic and includes educational fact sheets filled with age-appropriate information about wildlife, habitats, and the natural world. During our inaugural year, we will feature important ecosystems such as grasslands, forests, wetlands, and rivers.

To encourage participation and maximize our educational impact, we plan to award prizes beginning at \$2,000 per contest, with larger prizes as the organization grows. These incentives help attract families, increase engagement, and transform a fun coloring activity into an opportunity to learn about conservation and the importance of protecting our natural resources.

Our vision extends far beyond coloring contests. We aim to partner with schools, libraries, state parks, scouting organizations, after school programs, daycares, community centers, and other youth-focused programs to expand our reach. After-school programs, for example, provide an ideal setting for continuous outreach throughout the year and often serve children who might not otherwise receive this type of educational programming. Through sponsorships and donations, we also plan to support scholarships, conservation camps, outdoor education experiences, field trips, mentorship opportunities, and other programs that help young people explore careers in conservation and natural resources.

Your support helps fund contest prizes, educational materials, outreach efforts, scholarships, and future program growth including hiring full time education staff to spread conservation awareness. Our goal is to reach at least 5,000 families in our first year while building a program that inspires and educates children for years to come.

Inside this packet, you will find additional information about our organization, sponsorship opportunities, scholarship program, and future initiatives. We invite you to join us in helping children discover the wonder of nature and become the conservation leaders of tomorrow.

Why This Matters



Issue

- Worldwide, 2.8 billion children and 73 million in the U.S. largely lack awareness of critical environmental issues, including conservation, habitats, and current threats to wildlife
- Habitats and species are being destroyed at alarming rates
- Global biodiversity is declining rapidly, reducing everyday exposure to wildlife
- Environmental issues such as wildfires, droughts, and habitat loss are becoming more apparent

Education Gaps

- Conservation awareness needs to be increased
- Many schools have limited funding for hands-on conservation education
- Conservation and nature topics are often too complex without creative entry points
- Coloring nature related topics makes children think about what they are coloring

Importance of Early Childhood Engagement

- Conservation and nature awareness starts at an early age
- Early environmental education strongly predicts lifelong conservation behavior
- Engaging children early builds a pipeline for future conservationists, and land stewards
- Youth are a critical generation for long-term conservation success and policy change

- Creative learning tools like coloring improve retention compared to passive learning
- Visual storytelling helps children understand species, habitats, and ecosystems

Nature Disconnection

- Children are more disconnected from nature than ever

- Outdoor play time has dropped significantly over the last few decades
- Kids often lack structured opportunities to connect with local ecosystems

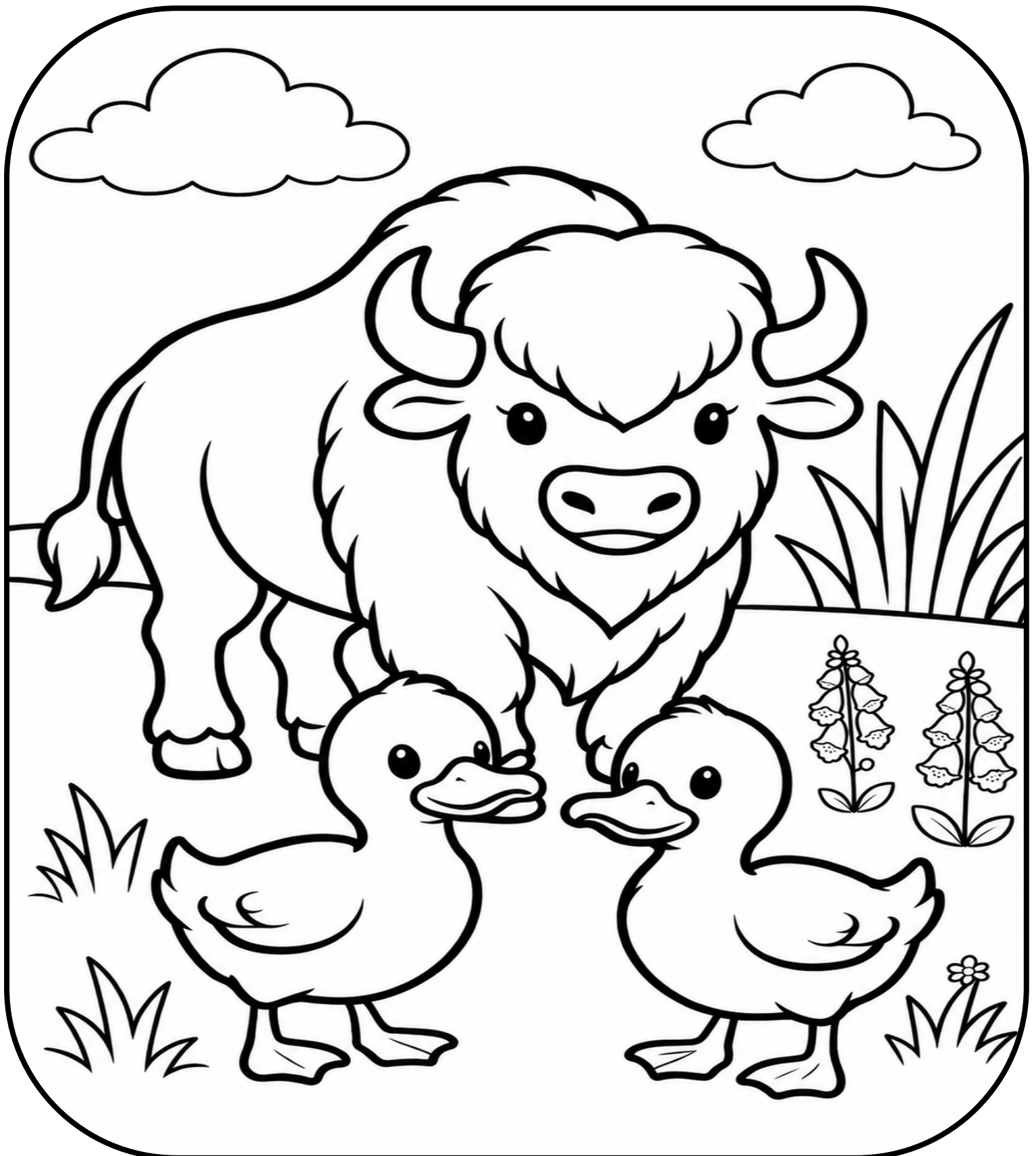

They support diverse wildlife, store carbon in deep roots, protect soil, and help feed people and livestock. Grasslands are increasingly threatened by farming, overgrazing, and urban development daily. **Coloring sheet for children 5 and under.**

Grasslands Fact Sheet

Hey Kids! This contest is all about grasslands. Do you know what a grassland is? Do you know what animals live in grasslands? Learn the answer to these questions below.

What is a Grassland?

A grassland is an ecosystem dominated by grasses, sedges, and forbs (wildflowers), with few or no trees. These open areas are shaped by factors like grazing animals, fires, and moderate rainfall, enough for grasses to thrive, but not enough for trees or forests.

Where are Grasslands located?

Grasslands are found on every continent except Antarctica! They go by different names around the world, such as savannas in Africa, steppes in Asia and Europe, pampas in South America, and prairies in North America. Some famous grasslands include the wide-open Great Plains (prairies) in the United States and the huge Serengeti in Africa, which is famous for species migrations.

Why are Grasslands important?

Grasslands once covered about 40% of Earth's land surface (excluding Antarctica and ice-covered areas), but many have been lost or degraded due to farming, urban sprawl, and other changes. They remain one of the most threatened ecosystems worldwide.

These open landscapes support incredible biodiversity often hundreds of plant species in small areas that provide food, shelter, and habitat for countless animals. Grasslands also store large amounts of carbon (especially in soils), prevent soil erosion, support grazing for wildlife and livestock, and deliver key benefits like clean water and air for people.

Grassland Species -

Bison- Bison once numbered up to 60 million on the plains stretching from Canada down to Mexico.

Cheetah- The fastest land animal on Earth, sprinting across African savannas to catch prey!

Lion- Kings of the savanna, living in prides and hunting in open grasslands.

Pronghorn- Often called “antelope,” these North American grassland runners are among the fastest land mammals.

Prairie rattlesnake- These amazing critters can live over 20 years and grow up to 5 feet long, but look out, they are venomous!

Purple coneflower (Echinacea)- Pretty purple petals with a spiky center, great for medicine too!

Ostrich- The biggest bird in the world can't fly, but it runs super-fast across African grasslands, up to 45 mph!

Other Species- Many other creatures like wildebeest, rhinos, prairie dogs (in temperate areas), and countless birds and insects depend on these open spaces too!

Key words

- **Ecosystem** - A unit of living things that interact with their environment.
- **Grazing** - When animals like bison, cows, or zebras eat grasses and wildflowers in open areas.
- **Savanna** - A type of tropical grassland with scattered trees, common in Africa.
- **Urban sprawl** - The act of cities and populated areas spreading.
- **Biodiversity** - The rich variety of different plants, animals, and other living things in an area.
- **Soil erosion** - When wind or water washes or blows away the top layer of dirt, making the land less health for species.

Grasslands are awesome, but they're disappearing fast because of farming and urban expansion. Your colorful drawings can help spread the word about why we need to protect them! Who Can Apply:

- Passionate about conservation, animals, nature, or the environment

Award Amounts:

- \$250 – smaller camps, field trips or a college club that wants to attend a meeting
- \$500 – week-long camps or short programs
- \$1,000-1,000+ – multi-week camps, semester fees, or larger tuition support

How to Apply: Applications are accepted year-round. We review them quarterly and notify winners within 30 days.

 - Amount you are requesting (\$250, \$500, \$1,000, \$1,000+)
3. **Short Essay (200–500 words):**
 - Tell us in your own words: “Why do you love nature and conservation and how will this opportunity help you or your class learn more or make a difference?”

- Parents or teachers please feel free to help, but the content must come from the kids
- 4. **Optional Supporting Materials:**
 - A photo or scan of your favorite coloring contest entry (if you've entered before)
 - Letters of recommendation, report cards, or proof of acceptance (not required, but helpful)

Selection Process: Our small team and board review every application fairly. We prioritize:

- Demonstrated passion for conservation
- How the opportunity will help you grow as a future conservationist or a person that respects the natural resources around the world
- If you are selected, you must provide a short video thanking our sponsors and may be requested to join a live call with the sponsors

Winners will receive funds either directly or paid to the program on your behalf and may be featured (with permission) on our website and social media to inspire others. Proof of receipt is needed within 30 days.

Future Vision



1. **Recruit and hire education staff** to distribute our themed coloring sheets and deliver related curriculum in K-12 schools, daycares, afterschool programs (GAP, Boys and Girls Club), children's museums, and beyond. Staff will provide standards aligned resources and interactive lessons on each contest topic to spark early conservation awareness.
 - a. This is the huge goal for CWC and a big reason we need your help!
 - b. With an education staff member in every state, we can rapidly grow the contest's visibility and impact, reaching schools and communities statewide while teaching the important topics highlighted in each contest.
2. **Create a FREE mentorship program** connecting conservation professionals from around the nation with students of all ages who are curious about conservation. This program will allow teachers to invite guest speakers into classrooms, help students navigate job applications and interviews, support the creation of school ecology clubs, and give families guidance on learning about the outdoors, such as planning educational weekend getaways, etc.
3. **Produce short interview series** on YouTube and social media featuring biologists and field staff from agencies, NGOs, and partners. Segments will highlight real insights tied to contest themes, inspiring viewers and boosting engagement.
4. **Attend Trade Shows** to feature our coloring sheets and teach about each topic.
5. **Launch an annual family conservation camp** that rotates among various locations each year, allowing participants to explore a variety of ecosystems. Through hands-on activities and outdoor learning experiences, families will gain a deeper understanding of conservation and develop a greater appreciation for biodiversity and the world around them.
6. **Start a conservation leadership course** for high school or college students that are curious about being leaders in the field of conservation.
7. **Private Lands Access Program** to allow children in urban areas to walk, explore, and learn outdoors on participating private properties at no cost. Because many cities lack accessible public natural areas on their outskirts, this program could expand opportunities for outdoor education, provide access to more open spaces, and give young people greater freedom to connect with nature and gain hands-on learning experiences.
8. **Build the next generation of conservation leaders** by inspiring millions of children to become lifelong advocates for wildlife, habitats, and natural resources through creative, accessible conservation education.
